





A Season of Waiting

More than anything, Advent is a celebration of a hope that God's promises will be fulfilled, that God can be born again, over and over in our hearts and in our world. Of all the seasons that make up our Church year, this is probably the busiest. With the celebration of Christmas so near, there are many things that we need to accomplish and there are many distractions that allow us to become sidetracked. We would be wise people to follow the old adage that tells us "a watched pot never boils." Everything about this time or year seems to turn Advent into a "watched pot." So much around us is propelling us toward Christmas with alarming speed, for example, a regular countdown of the number of shopping days until Christmas, snarled traffic and no parking places, Salvation Army bell ringers, Christmas music everywhere. In the midst of all this, what is the "watched pot"?

What exactly are we supposed to be watching for? How are our energies used up during this short period of time? When we allow life to swallow us up with all of the trappings of what is going on around us, we can certainly feel lost and out of control. Life seems to get tougher and tougher the more we try to do. In the midst of all this business we start to feel lost and out of control. We loose sight of our purpose and we start to look at things to blame. The people during the time Isaiah wrote this first reading were feeling absolutely out of control. They had lost sight of so many important things in life and were looking to blame God for their troubles. More than anything else, they felt no hope. The prophet reminds them that they need to get in touch with what is hopeful in their lives. In so doing they will realize what is important and what might not be so important and in the process regain control over their lives.

Our second reading reminds us that we cannot always live our lives only in the present, without an awareness or consideration that there is a future. As people, we often tend to get so caught up with what is going on around us that we do just that. Advent reminds us that there is a future and that future is full of God's promises. No matter how overwhelmed we might feel at the moment, it won't last if we keep a healthy perspective on what we are doing and why, in other words be aware of the "watched pot." We need to be aware of the fact that we live now and be responsible because there is a future worth waiting for.

How you spend this season of waiting is entirely up to you. However, it would behoove you to slow down and keep an eye on that "watched pot." If we can keep a healthy perspective on how we are living and what we make so important in life, we will find that we are at peace. It is never too late to wake up the reality what it means to be ready and watchful. We must be alert that our watching does not miss that for which we truly wait. We await the fullness of Christ's coming in a world still darkened by sinfulness.

St. Nicholas | Feast Day December 6

St. Nicholas of Bari (March 15, 270 – December 6, 343), the bishop of Myra in the fourth century, is the saint that Santa Claus is modeled after. Known for his kindness and generosity to the poor, the story has it that St. Nicholas once tossed bags of gold through the open window of a poor man's house to help his daughters avoid a life of prostitution.

According to legend, the gold landed in stockings dangling on the corners of the beds, which is why many of us celebrate St. Nicholas Day by hanging stockings and filling them with candy, fruit, and small toys.

Not much else is known about this beloved saint, but regardless, his reputation as a generous man continues today The Diocesan Christmas Night Market is planned Saturday, Dec. 14, from 1-8 p.m. at Christ Our Shepherd Center, Greensburg. The Christmas Night market is a festive, fun and faith-filled
